

If Not the Whole Truth Leave the Dogs at Home: A Memoir

Book Blurbs

"If Not the Whole Truth"

A young woman struggles to ferret out her place in the counterculture of the late 1960s era only to find in 2022 America that everything she holds dear, even her own life, is in jeopardy.

Connie Borders sees the changes coming down in 1969 and refuses to let them pass her by. Rejecting her parents' outdated lifestyle and the narrow, whitebread path prescribed for her, Connie leaves Indianapolis for California to stop the Vietnam War and reshape the country into the Woodstock Nation. Her course veers when Carlos, an older university student who is a first-generation, Black Puerto Rican American, persuades her that radical Chicago is where it's at.

During a whirlwind of protests and an acid-laced rock concert, electricity runs between Connie and Carlos. But when she witnesses a shooting in the wake of Black Panther Fred Hampton's murder, she is forced to leave Chicago. From the Midwest to Berkeley and back, Connie goes on a freewheeling search for her place in the fractured movement. Naïve and flawed but pure-hearted, she navigates the complexities of friendship and family, of unwanted pregnancy and illegal abortion, and of cultural and political divides, while untangling her desire for Carlos and his hardcore passion for Puerto Rican independence. Relying on inspiration from the writings of birth control advocate Margaret Sanger as a positive female revolutionary role model, Connie learns she must trust her instincts to seek out the whole story—which may not be the whole truth—as she defines who she is, what she thinks, and what happens to her body. Fifty years later, when Connie is a pro-choice activist in Chicago, her questioned convictions put her in chilling danger.

"Leave the Dogs at Home, a Memoir"

After the death of her friend, lover, enemy, and husband, Claire must discover a new self. Sustained by good dogs and gardening, she navigates daunting home repair, career disaster, unearthed family roots, and geezer dating with fierce humor and stubbornness to finally learn how to build a better life on the debris of an old one.

Delightfully confessional and insightful, "Leave the Dogs at Home" maps and plays with the stages of grief, as it challenges societal norms about relationships.

The book, published in 2015, is part of the Breakaway Books imprint of Indiana University Press. It won the 2016 AAUP Public and Secondary School Library Selection and was cited as an excellent choice by the Library Journal.

Blood Terminal: Murder in the Magic City

Book Blurb

Blood Terminal: Murder in the Magic City, set in 1931 Birmingham in the Southern Railways terminal environment, focuses in telling detail on the Jim Crow period as experienced by a diverse array of period characters, White and Black, rich and poor. When a murder takes place on a train, the head Pullman porter recruits the one railroad detective he hopes will handle the case fairly. As time passes, the porter and his wife, a domestic in the home of a railroad board member, assist the detective, but things look grim for people they care about when the city police take over.

Centering closely on the lives of Pullman porters, who so infrequently appear in fiction, *Blood Terminal* captures aspects of the racial interactions that existed both within the period's caste strictures and in spite of them. Glimpses of the Great Depression, Prohibition, and the glory of train travel enrich the novel's narrative.

As reviewed by Michael Radon: "The temporal undercurrents of racism and segregation in the South, the politics and logistics of rail travel, and the raucous Prohibition-era nightclubs dazzle on page after page and give tremendous life to every moment in the story. Details here work in great service to the story and never feel included purely for the sake of proving the author did their homework. The pace is snappy, and the narrative is free of bloat. ... This book is a phenomenal love letter to both the romance and warts of an era gone by, wrapped neatly around a suspenseful tale of murder that gives out enough clues to be engaging without watering down its dramatic finish."

The Bard and the Barman

Book Blurb

The Bard and the Barman is a marked departure from humdrum explanations for Shakespeare's "lost years". Scholars have looked too close to home, failing to see that the Bard was a Francophile at heart, as is evident in one of his early plays, Love's Labour's Lost, obviously based on "Good King Henri" of France.

Due to the journal of a barman at London's Bayside Inn, where Shakespeare stayed during his apprenticeship as a playwright, we now know the scoop. Not only does the barman shed light on Shakespeare's coming-of-age in France, but he reveals why the Bard had to destroy the sequel to his first attempt at comedy, leaving a batch of lovesick characters frozen in time.

Thank goodness that the rather foolish but observant barman took it upon himself to follow in the footsteps of Plutarch, recording the Bard's confessions for posterity. Perhaps the barman's greatest revelation is that Shakespeare was no armchair traveler, but spent as much time as possible in France, where the climate and cuisine were more conducive to his tastes. His travels also help account for his encounters with Henri IV and Miguel de Cervantes (who died the day before Shakespeare).

In short, the Bard didn't just write drama, he lived it.

Bio

Born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin in 1934, She was then raised in Wisconsin and Minnesota during her younger years. She has lived and studied in Switzerland and Germany. Graduated from Valparaiso University in 1957 and married her childhood sweetheart, and she and her husband both received their PhD from the University of Michigan. She got hers in Linguistics, having taught German at the University of Michigan and Indiana University, she then left linguistics after being rejected due to being a faculty wife. After living in Czechoslovakia, under a totalitarian regime, she got involved in local politics in Bloomington, Indiana. She was then the first elected female city council president in 1971, in a transformative election in Bloomington. During this time of being a city council president, she opened her store, Goods for Cooks in 1973 with Marilyn Schulz, the state representative from Bloomington. She ran unsuccessfully for congress in 1978 but was elected the first women county commissioner in 1980 in Monroe County, as a democrat in the regime landslide. As a county commissioner, she preceded over the restoration of the courthouse in Monroe County, reelected as commissioner in 1984, she worked tirelessly to defeat the construction of potentially dangerous PCB incinerator, following jobs included being community organizer for Planned Parenthood in southern Indiana, executive director of United Way, and economic developer for

Middle Way House, a shelter for abused women, aiding in the construction of a new shelter and businesses'. From 1988 to 2006, she served as a university trustee at Indiana State. She has two children, Rebecca and Nathan Zietlow, two very successful lawyers, and three wonderful granddaughters and a grandson who passed in 2019, in a tragic accident. Her wonderful husband Paul passed in 2015. She still currently resides in Bloomington Indiana, still being a very active member of the community.

Bio

Keiko was born on a small island in the Inland Sea of Japan. She grew up in a typical Japanese extended family with her parents, two brothers, and grandparents. Uncles, aunts, and cousins also lived nearby. She came to the United States in 1973 to continue her education, and in 1976 she graduated magna cum laude with a bachelor's degree in graphic arts from California State University at Northridge.

While working as a graphic designer, Keiko read Leo Lionni's masterful work, <u>Frederick</u>, and she became interested in picture books. She began experimenting with picture books in her free time. Her first book was published in 1981 in Japan and thereafter she continued to publish in her native language. The Wolf's Chicken Stew, a 1987 ALA notable book and the winner of the 1989 Kentucky Bluegrass Award, was her first work to be published in the United States. She has now published 22 books and her work is translated into 16 languages.

Keiko compares the process of creating a book to acting on stage under the lights: "I become the character that I'm working on at that moment. I pretend that I'm a bird looking for a mother, or a pig trying to impress his girlfriend. When I'm acting, I'm a child myself." Her ambition is not to create a hundred books but to create one really good book that will be kept on the bookshelves for generations (although a hundred good books would be even better, of course!)

Keiko Kasza lives in Bloomington, Indiana with her husband, a professor of Japanese politics at Indiana University, and they have two sons.

Nate Powell is a National Book Award-winning cartoonist who began self-publishing comics as an Arkansas teenager in 1992. His work includes the new graphic novel *Fall Through* and a comics adaptation of James Loewen's *Lies My Teacher Told Me*, as well as *Save It For Later*, civil rights icon John Lewis' *March* trilogy and its follow-up *Run*, viral comics essay About Face, and graphic novels *Come Again*, *Two Dead*, *Any Empire*, and *Swallow Me Whole*. He has published nonfiction comics and written for The Washington Post, The Nib, Popula, Booklist, CNN, and The Weather Channel.

Powell's work has also received a Robert F. Kennedy Book Award, multiple Eisner and Ignatz Awards, ALA and YALSA distinctions, the Comic-Con International Inkpot Award, and the CXC Transformative Work Award. He has discussed his work at the United Nations, as well as on MSNBC's The Rachel Maddow Show, CNN, NPR, PBS, and Free Speech TV.

From 1992 to 2010, he performed and toured in multiple underground punk bands including Soophie Nun Squad and Universe, and managed DIY label Harlan Records.

Powell is currently drawing Diana, a character-centered prequel to Fall Through to be released in 2026. He lives in Bloomington, Indiana.
